

























Mary Gunn's Restaurant, Lockport, 1926. Mary Gunn had a restaurant before World War I, and during the war. Omer Upper did the cooking, and all the men working on the Lockport Bridge would go there for lunch. 25¢ bought you a full steak dinner, 15¢ bought you a whole raisen pie and 20¢ bought you a whole lemon pie. Mary upset and shocked the Presbyterian community by having her restaurant open all day Sunday, 1926.





Slusarchuk family: In 1946, John Slusarchuk, in partnership with Peter and Lena Slusarchuk purchased a small building in Lockport. The building measured 20' long x 24' wide but, according to the purchase agreement, it was to be enlarged within two years. The work was completed by 1948 and the building measured 66.3' long by 24' wide. It contained a hall and living quarters. John intended to use the large section as a dance hall and movie theatre, but over the years, it has housed a pool hall and a barbershop. On the demise of Peter and Lena, Walter Slusarchuk became the owner. It was later sold to Karen Faires and is used today as a grocery store.






