Our family interests are church, 4H, and sports. My time is now spent doing volunteer work for the Heart Foundation and watching our grandchildren skate in the winter and participate in Field Day events in the spring.

Lois was born and raised in McCreary, Manitoba. Sid was born and raised in Sydney, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia.

Beaton, George

George is the son of William Beaton (1883-1947) and Alma Grace nee Cromarty (1888-1969). He was raised and resides on river lot 13, now 5281 Highway #9 at Parkdale in the Rural Municipality of St. Andrews. This property was part of the 124 acres for which his grandfather James Cromarty obtained patent in 1877.

He is now retired from Litz Crane where he worked for thirty years. His widowed sister Alma and her daughter Marilyn also lived on the home place until recent years. Alma's husband Ralph McGowan Reid died in Italy while with the lst Canadian Armoured Service in 1944. Alma's daughter and husband Dave Olason live in Arizona and have a daughter Kelly and a son Scott. Alma is now a resident of the Betel Home in Selkirk.

Their father William Beaton worked for years as a railway road builder using four horses and a hand scraper. Later, he transported pupils from the Parkdale area to St. Andrew's School and delivered mail on his return trip, for thirty years until his passing in 1947.

At that time the route along the River Road was difficult in winter. Sometimes four horses were needed to pull the school van on sleighs through the heavy snow and drifts. Often he would have to go through open fields rather than on the road. In those years, snow clearing equipment was not as efficient as the snow blowers of today. William Beaton's family is as follows: Clifford married Muriel Sparling, Wilfred married Muriel Clyne, Clarence married Mary McCrae, Grace married Stanley Mickelson, Alma married Ralph Reid, Beatrice married John Leigh, Edith married Dan Greening, Myrtle married Jack Mondor, Georgina married Tony Wasio, George never married, and Geraldine who married Gordon Moodie.

William Beaton (1850-1938), the grandfather of the above was born in Scotland and married Catherine McDonald (1860-1928). She was the sister of Margaret (Mrs. George Parks) of River Road and daughter of John McDonald and Elizabeth nee Anderson. He bought river lot 23 running four miles west from the Red River and made his living from farming and fishing. Their other grandparents were James Cromarty (1824-1911) and Nancy nee Inkster (1836-1891). The Cromarty family was an ex-Hudson Bay family that began farming river lot 13 at Parkdale.

Beddome, Dr. Henry A Family Doctor

It was in September 1865, that Dr. Henry Beddome established his home and medical practice in St. Andrews about a mile south of St. Andrewson-the-Red on the River Road. Beddome had come out from England to York Factory for the Hudson's Bay Company in 1852 as ship's surgeon for a term of 5 years. He was a graduate from Guy's Hospital in London, England. After completing an additional five year contract, and because he liked what he saw of the Northwest, he decided to practice in this part of the world. He married Frances Omand (of Omand's Creek in Winnipeg) in 1859. Henry and Frances had eight children - whose births were carefully recorded in the family Bible. Anne Eveline, the second eldest became Mrs. Joseph McDonald of Clandeboye.

He served a large area in St. Andrews parish without much in the way of monetary reward as at that time, goods and services were exchanged. He rode on horseback to his calls or treated patients in his dispensary. It is said that when Louis Riel went into hiding in 1876, Beddome concealed him for awhile in his dispensary. When smallpox broke out among the newly arrived Icelandic settlers at Gimli, Dr. Beddome was selected by the province to take over the supervision of the Gimli District. He laboured without any help or relief for 6 months to attend the ill, enduring many hardships.

In 1871, Dr. Beddome and four other pioneer doctors were the founders of the Provincial Medical Board of Manitoba. The name was changed to "The College of Physicians and Surgeons of Manitoba" in 1877. He continued to practice at St. Andrews and also served the mental patients when they were housed at Lower Fort Garry. Dr. Beddome died in 1881. His diplomas were displayed in the Medical Arts Building in Winnipeg, his instruments were given to the Mental Hospital at Selkirk, and a cabinet from his dispensary is now in the doctor's office in Lower Fort Garry. The good doctor is buried in St. Andrews churchyard.





On page 212, the names under the picture should be Anna and Theodore Boehmer not Bochen and Else Berndt, not Berntt. Also Doretta Shannon should be Doretta Chanin. On page 234 under the picture of The Chanin gathering in Stonewall it had been printed Sara Chanin instead of Sam Chanin. Mary Chanin died in 1924 not 1904. On page 235 the picture called Pleasant Visit has Ab Bochner instead of Ab Boehmer, and Bob Bochner instead of Bob Boehmer.

The Bolton Family

Joseph and Sarah Bolton originally came from County Down, Ireland. They came to Canada in 1854, when they were both eighteen years of age.

I am not certain when they first came to the Petersfield area. They lived in the Dunara District on Section NE 36-15-4E.

They are buried in the Dunara Cemetery:

Joseph and Sarah had eight children.

Jane, Mae, Liz, William, John, Jim, Tom and Emma.

The children lived in other areas.

John lived in Dunara at the home place at the time of his death in 1960.

Jane also lived in Dunara at the home place at the time of her death in 1951.

Both John Bolton and Jane Strowger are buried in the Dunara Cemetery.

Tom's son Arnold Bolton married Muriel Day. They moved to the home place on Section NE 3615-4E in May 1952. Arnold and Muriel had two children, Gilbert and Harvey.

Arnold died in 1998. Muriel died in 1989.

John and Edna Bolton came to the Norwood District of Petersfield in 1932. They moved here from Dugald, Manitoba. They first lived at 27-15-3 on the Petersfield Road in the years 1932-1952. They farmed this land which they rented from Mr. Atiniko.

In 1952 John and Edna purchased a farm from Mr. Joe Goulee at 13-15-3E on the Hartley School Road. Boltons owned this farm from 1952 to 1974. They had three children, Jim, Mildred, Lynda.

John farmed the land here for the summer months and in the winter months he worked for Abitibi Pulp and Paper Company in Pine Falls. In winter he had 36 horses that went to work in the bush skidding pulpwood. John was the Barn Boss tending to the horses, and Edna was the cook who provided good nutritious meals for the crew of men who had been hired to work the horses.

Edna died in 1967.

John retired at the age of 65 from Abitibi Pulp and Paper. He farmed until 1974 when they sold the farm to Mr. Bruce Crosby. John went to live at Patricia Beach where he worked for Gull Lake Sand and Gravel for several years. He finally retired for good and moved to Selkirk where he lived out the rest of his life. John died in 1996.

Mr. Bruce Crosby sold the farm NE 13-15-3E to Latimer Kowalchuk. Mr. Latimer Kowalchuk sold the farm to the present day owner Mr. Ken Dalman.

The house that was on the property when Bolton's bought the farm was an old school house that had been built in 1891. A Mr. Sylvester (Kelly) Isaac had moved it there when a new one-room school was built in 1920. This school opened January 1921, but was destroyed by fire in 1936. The new school was built in 1936-37 and was used until the schools amalgamated in 1967.

The Bolton house was eventually torn down and replaced by the present day home. This house was moved onto the property from Winnipeg.

We have seen many changes in this area over the years. The arrival of Hydro for us was in 1952. Small one-room schoolhouses where the children rode horses to or walked to are no longer open. The school districts amalgamated and now the children are bused to centrally located schools in Clandeboye for grades 1-6, Lockport for grades 7-9 and Selkirk for grades 10-12. The schools used to have a Sports Field Day, which was held in early June at the Petersfield School grounds. Each school had their own colours. Norwood School was green and gold. We all practiced very hard for this day. All schools marched and were judged before the sporting events started. It was a real special family day. Picnic lunches were brought and there were lots of ribbons for the winners of the sports events. The students all competed but the schools also competed for points and honours as well.

The Christmas concerts at the one-room schools were another highlight for everyone. There were many practices and rehearsals, with skits, recitations and carols. It was great!!! Santa always seemed to make his arrival, with the help of one of the local fathers or uncles, or whoever could be convinced to wear the famous red suit that year.

The Sunday school Picnic that was held at Winnipeg Beach was a real memorable time for all. The Boardwalk – the rides – the atmosphere of it all was an ultimate highlight for everyone.

The Petersfield and Clandeboye grain elevators are now gone.

Petersfield now has a Hotel and Beer Parlor that the women can go to. For good or not - I don't know.

They now grade the roads within hours of a snow storm, as years ago they only graded Highways 8 and 9 and you had to get out to the highway by horses and sleigh. You could catch the bus to Winnipeg from one of the local stores along the highway. These stores are now closed or gone. Petersfield and Clandeboye still have their own stores and post offices.

My father's old steel wheel McCormick-Deering tractor has now been replaced in the fields with giant four-wheel drive tractors. Monstrous combines that seem to do ten times the work in a quarter of the time have now replaced the binders and threshing machines and threshing gangs.


St. Andrews now has our own volunteer fire department. Thanks to the fire department and the grader operator who reported the fire, they saved our house from burning to the ground in 1983.

James Robert Bruce was born in Bradford City, England, son of Robert Bruce and Elizabeth Ingram. He joined the British Army at a very young age and saw service in Africa in the Boer War from 1899 -1901. He rejoined the British Army in December 1914 and served in France until October 1916 when he was wounded in action. In 1918, he emigrated to Canada where he joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force, serving in the PPCLI from February, 1918, until February, 1919. In Halifax, she boarded the train for Winnipeg where she was met by her mother and step-father, Alfred Rivers. In Winnipeg, Emily met James Robert (Jack) Bruce (also called JR by his close friends). They were married in August, 1920. Jack received his discharge from the

David Brydges, 1868-1964 was born to David

and Betsy Bridges (sic) of Parki (sic) Creek and baptized in the Parish of St. Andrews on December 4, 1875.

He was a colourful gentleman; an expert oakum boat caulker who cooked the best breakfast; bacon, cut from the slab, and eggs cooked in a big black frying pan over a wood stove. He served tea out of glass cups and saucers and it has been said that you could stand a spoon up in his tea. He was a terrific harmonica player and he was a pipe smoker.

He always had lots of wood cut up and neatly

piled all around his little house, which was very important to him. In his early years in Clandeboye he made trips into Selkirk in a big sleigh, pulled by his dog, while in later years he would come and go by taxi.

He married Eliza Prince, 1862-1936, reportedly a descendant of Chief Peguis.

In 1914, Eliza's aunt, Mrs. Charlotte Hodgins bequeathed all of her furniture to Eliza and in 1921 Eliza exchanged three bullocks and ten dollars in exchange and payment for three heifers and one cow named "\$10.00", "Rabbit", "Whitehead" and "Whitey" respectively. The understanding between Ed Cocherane was that he was to have complete ownership and control of the bullocks and she was to have complete ownership and control of the heifers and cow.

Mary McAulay of Clandeboye tells of Eliza always walking into the village with a snow-white apron on. She says also, that Eliza used to wash her wooden floors with ashes from the wood stove. These ashes contained lye and her floors would be so clean they were white.

Eliza was always helping people and one time she went to help someone who had pneumonia, got sick herself, and died.

David and Eliza's daughter, Rubina (Ruby) Ellen Harriet Brydges was born March 1, 1898 and baptized in the Parish of St. Peter's Dynevor, March 13, 1898; their address was given as Clandeboye-St. Peter's.

Chamberlain, Arthur and Family

My father, Edward Chamberlain came to Canada in 1906 from Somerset, England. He met my Mother Annie Mitchell from Sussex, England in 1909 and they were married in Old St. Andrew's Church in 1911.

They moved from Winnipeg in 1914, buying a farm of 80 acres from Mr. and Mrs. Vincelette in an area called Buttertown (now Rossdale), on Donald Road. Here they operated their dairy farm as well as mixed farming until he died October 28, 1954. Father was 73 and Mother who died November 29, 1985 was 101 years old.
