




















NORTHERN BUS LINES



George Homenick's career with the transportation service, spanned a period of over twenty-five years. In 1925, he began to drive for his older brother Peter, who owned Red River Motor Coach Lines. In 1928, he became the proud owner and driver of his own bus service, the Northern Bus Lines. At first, he was able to drive only as far as Thalberg because of road conditions.

In 1933, when his bus line became the first to travel to Grand Beach and that part of Manitoba, inclement weather causing frequent flooding of the roads often made that passage impassable.

Over the years, George had a total of five different buses and eventually increased his Winnipeg-Grand Beach service to twice a day.


George drove his own buses until an injury in 1946, forced him to enlist other drivers. His brother Bill, brother-in-law Phillip Elmes, and a succession of other men, drove for him until he sold the business to his brother Peter in 1951.




George Homenick's 2nd bus. Northern Bus Lines. Emma Homenick standing beside the bus.






























